In July, Dan contacted the Volunteer Action Centre to help KPMG with preparing for their fall volunteering event. The conversation was led by **Cheryl Rose** of the **Social Innovation Generation, University of Waterloo**. Cheryl was ideal for leading our dialogue thanks to her roots in **Community Service Learning** from both the University of Guelph and U of W.

Cheryl stimulated discussion about social **change** and how change impacts us personally. She asked us to think about our concepts of **leadership** and the importance of **reflection**. This discussion resulted in the formation of new thoughts and relationships and a shared understanding of our common goals to build a better community by helping contribute wherever we can.

This year KPMG helped 10 organizations who hosted over 100 KMPG partners and employees at this event. Over the past 5 years, KPMG has devoted over 500 days of volunteer service to local agencies. Thanks to everyone who participated!

Our goal is to ease the team volunteering engagement process and find models for team volunteering that will enhance the value of this volunteering form for our membership; at the same time, it is essential for local businesses and post-secondary institutions, the largest growth potential for this form of engagement, that their experiences be meaningful.

As part of our **Supported Volunteering** program we received a grant from the **KW Community Foundation** to develop a curriculum to prepare newcomers to be ready to volunteer. This product should be ready to launch by May, 2009.

With these projects in place and a maternity leave among our small staff there are a number of staff changes of which we want our membership to

be aware. Dianne will continue to provide advice and support to newer staff as she focuses on the Team Volunteering project. Kate is filling in for Prachi in the role of Recruitment Coordinator. Kate works one on one with clients looking to volunteer, is coordinator of all the recruitment advertising and promotions and will be the lead on the Volunteer Readiness project. Joanna Michalski, our newest staff member, is providing member services. She is coordinating the Training and Consultation service. There are a number of new initiatives in this area that will be announced in the New Year. Robin is our volunteer coordinator and is responsible for all the in-office administrative tasks which she shares with our wonderful volunteers.

As we approach the end of 2008, I would like to personally and on behalf of our Board and Staff, thank you all for your continued support of our organization and wish you the very best for the holiday season and cheers to 2009.

Ontario honours local senior for dedication to community

Waterloo's Margaret Evans was among the 20 people over the age of 65 who received one of this year's Ontario Senior Achievement awards in special ceremony at

Queen's Park recently.

Margaret's sons and daughter and a granddaughter watched with pride as she was presented with a plaque signed by Premier Dalton McGuinty, and a pin honouring her for her many accomplishments and contributions to our community. Aileen Carroll, Minister responsible for Seniors, officiated at the presentation in the absence of Lieutenant-Governor, David Onley, who was unable to attend

She was nominated for the award by the resident advisory board of Luther Village, where she has resided since 1997. She served several years on the board, twice as chair, as well as chairing its finance, choir and other committees. For all these and other contributions to the Luther Village community, she received its Citizenship Award in 2002.

Margaret is a professional historian, author of a major study on the longest serving Ontario premier, Sir Oliver Mowat, as well as the writer of articles on Canadian and Ontario History.

She co-authored a book on the rise of Ontario veterinarians, which was awarded a medal of excellence in the history of medicine. Margaret worked as a consultant in setting up the Ontario Veterinary College Museum and Archives in 1982 and was a consultant in the writing of a book on the history of the City of Waterloo. During the '80s, Margaret was active in volunteer work, chairing property and personnel committees and the board of the Waterloo Public Library during a time an addition was built which doubled the size of the library and a computer system was studied and selected. She received a plaque from the Waterloo city council for 10 years of voluntary service to the library board.

She was a member of Waterloo's Recreation and Leisure Task Force and the Mayor's Senior Advisory Council and named K-W Senior Woman of the year in 1985.


Margaret also became involved with the Waterloo Regional Heritage Foundation and the Presbyterian Church of Canada, history committee.

Diagnosed with Graves' thyroid disease in 1980, she became concerned with the lack of information locally on thyroid problems and decided to form a local chapter of the Thyroid Foundation. Her continued dedication to this cause earned her awards from the foundation and the City of Kitchener's Senior Citizens Award for Health and Fitness in 2001.

Margaret was awarded the Canada 125 Medal in 1993 for founding the thyroid chapter and her activities in the Waterloo Regional Heritage Foundation. She was also made an honorary member of Wilfrid Laurier University Alumni Association for her "valuable contributions."

Although still involved in the local thyroid chapter she founded, arthritis has limited her activity in other projects and forced her to find a new home for her cat, who was featured in a book she wrote on beloved companions. She retains, however, a keen interest in history and her community.
